DOC Developments

Jim Staton was unable to attend the meeting and so gave us his written report.

- Contaminated Ground Remediation - Once work started on this it was found it was going to be more complex than expected. Hence the decision was made to put this project on hold until a new design for the Ball Mill internment pit is drawn up. The area remains closed to the public.

- the large holes that appeared in the ground above the road in the South Shaft area continues to be of concern. Laser scanning of these has been completed. Once funding becomes available, DOC, via John's company will 3D scan the Blackwater shaft collar and the new hole above the road, this when combined with ground surveys will accurately determine where the reef track ran and give us accurate information on the location of the winze's, shafts and other potential collapse sites

- materials for the re-piling of the Barbers shop are now at the Reefton DOC yard. This should be completed in the summer months.

- the Waiuta Township Entrance sign. This has morphed into something more substantial. Dave Hawes has designed and built a magnificent new information kiosk that looks like a mini red hut. Inside it will go the interpretation panels.

We are certainly being served well by DOC.

Oceana Gold

Oceana Gold has confirmed that work at the Globe Mine is about to end, probably about mid October.

For the next two years the mine would be put into 'care and maintenance' while the site is rehabilitated. There are still extraction resources and gold there, including at our Blackwater Mine but the current low price of gold makes it uneconomic to continue. If conditions were to improve then it would be relatively inexpensive to restart mining.

Christchurch Meetings

Another reminder here that 'on this side of the hill' we have regular meetings about 3 or 4 times a year where 'Waiuta-ites' and those interested meet to reminisce, tell stories and show photos. It is with sadness we note the recent passing of :

- Pamela Ball (nee Hocking) aged 81 in June. Pam lived in Waiuta from aged 3 to 9 after which she went to Christchurch. Her mother ran the Boarding House for single miners.

- Jack Robertson in July, aged 89. Jack, after completing an apprenticeship as a boilermaker / welder with the Railways became a maintenance worker. He lived in Waiuta from 1947 till 1951.

- Margaret Sadler - Senior (nee Dunn) aged 92 in June. Margaret went to Waiuta as a teenager from Greymouth to work for Julia and Les Harvey at their Bakery, only leaving after the closure of the mine.

- Jean Hunt (nee Lewis) aged 85, in September. Jean was one of the last babies born at Waiuta and lived there until she left for Christchurch for a short time before returning Reefton where she married Joe. She was one of the founding members of the FoW society in 1986. "She and I were like sisters," said Gwen Poole when she heard of her passing.


Next Meeting:
